## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This is a practical course at an Intermediate level that allows students to develop and improve their listening, comprehension and pronunciation skills while helping students succeed in the planned objectives from IO-5420. Furthermore, this course may help ones intonation and rhythm in the English language as well as a source of acquiring vocabulary.

### **TEACHING METHODOLOGY**

Students will listen to material with modeled pronunciation in which they have the opportunity of repeating and even taping the same. On other occasions, students will read passages to practice ones intonation and rhythm. Undergraduates will also carry out various exercises including paragraph completion and listening for specific information from lectures and others. Student participation in class is vital as he/she is responsible for listening, repeating, comprehending, reproducing, explaining what was heard, defining vocabulary terms, summing up a lecture, analyzing what was heard and seen, etc.
